REPORT ON THE PETACH MEMORIAL DINNER AND CHENNAULT MEMORIAL SERVICE

An enjoyable weekend was had by those attending the John E. Petach memorial dinner 7 June, 1975 at the Ramada Inn in North New Jersey (near Perth Amboy - Pete's home town). Mr. Rick Schraeder and Lew Levinson of the New Jersey Historical Assn. (Aviation) hosted the affair. We had a great turn-out (17) with Emma J., Jim Howard, Charlie Mott, the Joe Poshefko's, Allen Fritzke's, Mike Callan's, Twisty Bent's, Paul Clothier's, Bus Loane's, Walt Dolan's. Subsequently, Room 304 at the Inn hosted a party attended by the above, plus an equal number of the Historical Assn.

The historical association has plans for a temporary exhibit at the N. J. State Capitol at Trenton, and a permanent exhibit at the airport at Tom's River, N. J.

The attendees can't get over the hospitality and interest of the 100 people who attended. Among the guests was Tommy Walker of the International Group, which Gen. Chennault recruited prior to the AVG. It was a great turnout. Red Hanks, Jim Howard, and Charlie Mott all obliged as speakers with reminiscenses of Pete and the AVG at the dinner - all of which was very well received.

The Chennault Memorial Service on Memorial Day at Washington was most impressive. It was really a well organized program thanks to the Memorial Committee. The Chinese Embassy in particular were most gracious hosts at the Embassy reception. The Chinese don't fool around where food, drink, and convivality are concerned. Next year let's try for greater participation. Frank Andersen, Charlie Mott, Wayne Ricks and Hal Wylie placed the flowers on the tomb for our deceased in the past year. Don Berlin, the father of the P-40 was also there.

Phyllis adds:

We truly enjoyed the brief but honoring remarks from the head table at the Petach dinner. "Red" recalled a few humorous happenings, like being married with a black eye and beating the General at cribbage as long as Pete coached her. Red was more than pleased to see everyone because she hadn't heard if anyone was going to show. But you know us "Yankees", we wouldn't let our Lady Tiger down!

A special pamphlet, entitled "Tribute to a Tiger," was published by New Jersey Historical Association for the dinner. It recounted the exploits of the AVG and John Petach's part as a member of General Chennault's Flying Tigers. It described his career from his birth and education in Perth Amboy to his enlistment in the U.S. Navy and finally his volunteer service with the AVG, where he gave his life in divebombing a Japanese gunboat. He was one of a small group of pilots who volunteered to stay on after disbandment of the AVG in July, 1942. It was during this additional service period covering the transition of aerial combat from the AVG TO U.S. military forces that his career ended, just a few months after his marriage to Emma Jane Foster. Their daughter was born the following February of 1943.

Re: the '77 AVG/CNAC Reunion...A guest policy:

As Neil Armstrong was to be the honored guest at the TIGER Banquet, we decided on a plain introduction at the CNAC Banquet. However, I had a back up story just in case that might have come out something like the following:

In the second seat to my left sits Neil Armstrong - which is the story of my life - he has always been just outside of my reach. Seriously folks, on Sunday, July 20th, 1969, I sat at home, my eyes glued to the TV set, sweating Neil out on his trip to the moon - one shot after another. Shortly after Neil took 'giant step' (with another shot for me) I began to wonder what the temperature was there on the moon. I kept thinking, Jesus, why don't they tell us what the temperature is? Everybody wants to know. So I went to the kitchen phone (closer to the shots) and dialed NBC TV in NYC. They were unable to answer my question but did suggest that I call Mission Control in Houston. So I did what any red-blooded American would do, I called there and the two-way conversation went something like this:

"NASA, MISSION CONTROL, Staff Sgt. Alvin Bomier here." "Yes, my name is Red Holmes, I live in Stony Brook, NY and I'm one of the stockholders in this caper of yours, with a question. What is the temperature up there on the moon?" "Standby one." (hand cupped over phone - barely audible) "Some character on the phone here wants to know what the temp is on the moon." (inaudible) "Sir, in the sun or in the shade of the LEM?" "How about both, okay?" "Standby." (inaudible) - "Sir, it's zero degrees centigrade." "In the shade or the sun?" "Both, Sir." "Zero, huh---huhm. Is that estimated or actual?" "Standby." (audible) "Now he wants to know if that's estimated or actual." It's actual, Sir." "Thanks a lot, goodbye." (another shot) I don't like being put on and now I'm fuming. I'm thinking, "Red, if you were the first person to place a call to the moon, you might become famous, too." So I dial "O". "OPERATOR, may I help you?" My name is Holmes at (516) 751-2412 and I'm calling person-to-person to Neil Armstrong on the moon." "Do you have the Area Code, Sir?" "No, I think it's a new one." "One moment please, and I'll get my supervisor." - "This is Ms. Baker, may I help?" "Yes, I want to place a person-to-person call to Neil Armstrong on the moon." "Well, Sir, I don't believe we can complete your call." "I don't see why not---they are talking to him now from Mission Control in Houston." "Just a moment please, I will have to check with our technician." Soon an unidentified male voice came on the line apologetically, informs me that much as he would like to connect me, it is utterly impossible, -- no cables up there, yet." Dejected, I return to watching the box and Neil returns to the LEM. In a short while they cut in on the program and the announcer says: "We interrupt this program for the following SPECIAL----The President of the United States will now become the first person to talk on the telephone to an American on the moon." Like I said, Neil has always been just outside of my reach. And that's the truth.
