

Poignant homecoming

Airmen's remains coming back from Himalayas

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But this week, remains believed to be those of four American airmen killed during World War II when their cargo plane crashed onto a lofty meadow in eastern Tibet are finally on their way home—thanks to the cooperation of two governments that spent many of the intervening years as suspicious rivals.

No one is certain yet who they are, though the U.S. military has the crew manifest of the C-46 transport that went down in March 1944 along the "hump route," named for the spectacular lumps of snow-shrouded majesty that pilots see when crossing high above the Himalayas.

The remains were retrieved from the plateau, about 1,250 miles southwest of Beijing, during a nearly two-month operation conducted with Chinese government searchers during the summer. Another C-46 crash site several mountains away was

investigated and its contents tagged for future retrieval.

"It's like winning the jackpot, getting up there and finding these," U.S. Army Capt. Daniel N. Rouse, leader of the search team from the Army's Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii, said at a news conference Monday at the U.S. Embassy in Beijing.

The C-46, pressurized for high-altitude wartime runs, crashed during a return trip along the hump route, a supply run from India to the Chinese wartime capital of Kunming and back that ferried goods to China-based U.S. forces and Chinese Nationalist government forces battling the Japanese.

Five years later, the communists drove the Nationalists from the mainland and established a government the United States regarded as a threat, precluding for decades any chance of cooperative searches.

The airplane slammed into the mountain high above the Tibetan village of Langko and wound up in a pasture — an unusual sight amid the rocky terrain typical at 15,650 feet.

The wings, sheared off on impact, were found nearby; the fuselage, damaged but recognizable, still shone in the sun. Its landing gear was still up when found, and thick clouds were visible across that level of the mountain.



Your letter has caused me to spend many pleasant hours dreaming and sifting back to the war and the "hump". The Andy Anderson that I knew in India was listed on the comany roster as R. E. Anderson. Tall, Skinny, Thin face. He was flying a CNAC D.C.#3 as captain with two chinese crew members on December 12, 1944. They took aff from Dinjan headed for Kunming and dissappeared. They did not make the mindway radio report. Dissapeared. The same day I flew a trip from Dinjan to Suifoo and bacak. Good visibility but lots of wind.

On December 20th Frank Higgs and I flew a search mission to check out a report from the Naga hill natives of a downed plane East of Wingtong. We found the plane with only one wing and the tail showing above the brush.

Between Chrismas and New year we organized a ground party consisting of C. M. Mangun, 1311 North Hyacinth Circle, Barefoot Bay, FL, 32958-7152, Bob Blair, who is now dead, and myself. The US airforce rescue organization helped us get in contact with the natives who knew how to get to the aircraft. They met us at Wingtong and we walked-climbed for two hours to get to the Crash site.

The crash was bad. The plane was headed east. It went into the ground left wing first. The fire had obliterated allthe serial numbers and identification. We knew that it was Andy"s plane because it Was a DC 3 with landing gear that was different from the cargo C-47. The human remains were just three piles of bone and maggots. The big pile was Andy. The two smaller piles were the co-pilot and Radio operator

Mangun and Blair burried the remains. I scratched an inscription on the aluminum propeller blade. The three names. Date Cnac...

January second , 1945, Back to flying the hump.

We lost 5 more planes and crews in January. Terribile WX, Ice, Wind. I have no pictures of Andy.

Enclosed is a colfor map of west end of the hump.

I hope thes letter enables you to understand part of "andys chapter."




